How Can We Help Prepare Students for College?

Focus on 3 R's

- Reading, Writing, Mathematics - These still create roadblocks

Communicate

- Communicate directly the importance of attending class.

Stress

- Take responsibility for your actions and choices.

Expose

- Expose them to research opportunities.

Ask

- Ask students questions during class.

Encourage

- Encourage students to ask questions or seek assistance as a normal part of the learning process.

Challenge

- Utilize the higher levels of Bloom's Taxonomy...they will be expected to do that in college.

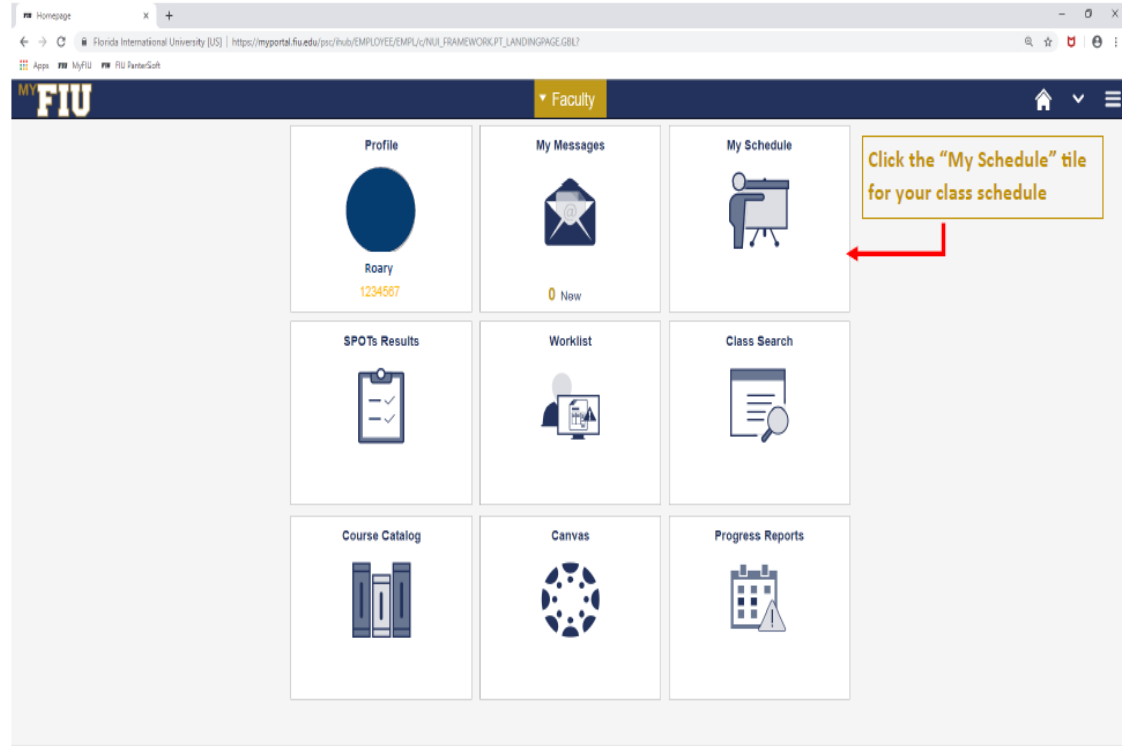

STUDENT ENROLLMENT

The FIU Dual Enrollment (DE) Program holistic approach consists of using GPAs, past performance in related courses, and college readiness scores to evaluate students. In addition, school administration may focus on counselor/teacher referrals. DE allows a school to use a “GPA waiver” for students who do not meet the 3.0 unweighted high school GPA minimum. For students with a 2.7-2.9 unweighted high school GPA, the **Waiver Form** can be used to document their academic potential for success in college-level courses. Waiver forms are signed by the school officials who recommend students for enrollment in DE courses at their school.

The following table presents factors which can be considered in the holistic approach for determining enrollment.

Holistic Approach Determinants of College Readiness

DE program will continue extension of holistic approach for Fall 2022.

@ High School program allows the use of a “GPA Waiver” – Unweighted HS GPA 2.7 – 2.9

GPA waiver/holistic approach are not applicable when determining eligibility to enroll in online courses or participation in the on-FIU campus program.

Refer to testing standards to meet scores for courses with pre-requisites.

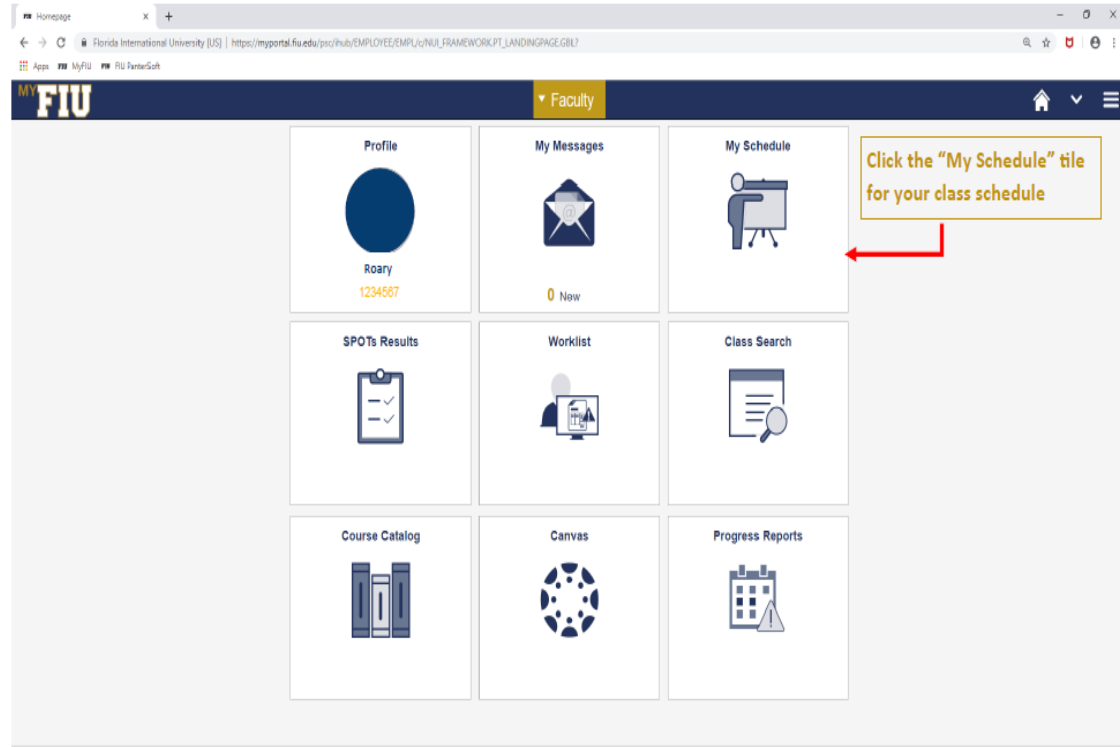

FIU UNIVERSITY CORE CURRICULUM

The UCC is required of freshmen admitted to FIU beginning Summer B 2015 and transfer students beginning Fall 2015.

FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE (1 course required)

This course provides a forum for integrating the FIU experience and for discussing issues promoting intellectual, personal, academic, social growth and success as a member of the University community. All students entering the University with fewer than 30 semester hours are required to take this one-credit course. High school earned college credit does not exempt students from this requirement.

—SL5 1501 First Year Experience (1 cr)

COMMUNICATION (2 three-credit courses required)

Students will demonstrate the ability to communicate effectively. Students will demonstrate the ability to analyze communication critically.

These are Gordon Rule courses. Must earn "C" or higher.

—ENC 1101 Writing and Rhetoric (3 cr)

—ENC 1102 Writing and Rhetoric II (3 cr)

HUMANITIES (2 three-credit courses required; one from Group One and one from Group Two.)

Students will confirm the ability to think critically through demonstrating interpretive ability and cultural literacy. Students will acquire competence in reflecting critically upon the human condition.

Courses with "GRW" are Gordon Rule courses. Must earn a "C" or higher to earn GRW credit. Courses with "GL" satisfy the University's Global Learning requirement.

Students will determine appropriate mathematical and computational models and methods in problem solving, and demonstrate an understanding of mathematical concepts. Students will apply appropriate mathematical and computational models and methods in problem solving.

Any student who successfully completes a mathematics course in Group Two for which a course in Group One is an immediate prerequisite shall be considered to have completed Group One and may take two mathematics courses from Group Two. However, ONE OF THE TWO MATHEMATICS COURSES MUST HAVE A MAC, MCF, OR MTF PREFIX.

These are Gordon Rule courses. Must earn "C" or higher.

Courses with "GRW" are Gordon Rule courses. Must earn a "C" or higher to earn GRW credit. Courses with "GL" satisfy the University's Global Learning requirement.

AMH 3020 and POS 2041 satisfy the state of Florida's Civic Literacy (CL) requirement if taken Fall 2010 or later.

Application for Associate in Arts Degree

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To be eligible to receive the AA degree from FIU, a fully-admitted degree-seeking student must:

- Complete 60 credits, at least 20 of which must be earned at FIU
- Complete all [University Core Curriculum](#) requirements (including GRW)
- Complete the Civic Literacy requirement, as appropriate
- Complete the foreign language requirement, FLENT/FLEX
- Have an earned FIU grade point average of 2.0 or higher
- Not have completed the bachelor's degree or applied for graduation
- Not have transferred in more than 40 credits
- Not have any pending incomplete course grades

Please note that AA degrees are certified after final grades are posted at the end of the semester. Awarding of the Associate in Arts degree may take 2-6 weeks after the end of the semester, and the designation will be posted to the FIU transcript. The university does not produce a diploma for the AA and there is no commencement ceremony for the AA.
